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Each year and each semester, you will be granted access to a specific set of subjects, ordered as follows:

Each subject is divided into **units**. Each unit is further divided into three parts including:
I. a video; II. a folder named “learning materials”; III. a test.

Within the **videos**, each professor illustrates the topic of the unit in around 15 minutes.
Some videos might be slightly longer or shorter (generally no more than 20 minutes).

The folder “**learning materials**” contains the readings and other files (e.g., the pptx file displayed in the video).
These materials are beneficial for studying the topic covered by the video.

Finally, the **test** evaluates your preparation and understanding of the topic, and you mandatorily have to pass it in order to start the next unit (restricted access). The tests can be either multiple choice type, true/false, open questions, or case studies - depending on each own’s professor’s choice.



Occasionally, you will also find another folder named “**extra learning materials**”. Here, professors may upload supplementary readings that could enhance your understanding of the topic.



For each subject you are required to take **an exam, in person**. In order to access the exam, it is **mandatory** to complete all unit's sections, as mentioned earlier. The exam dates are published on the university webpage, [here](#). If you aim at a high grade, we recommend you complete 3 units per subject/week.

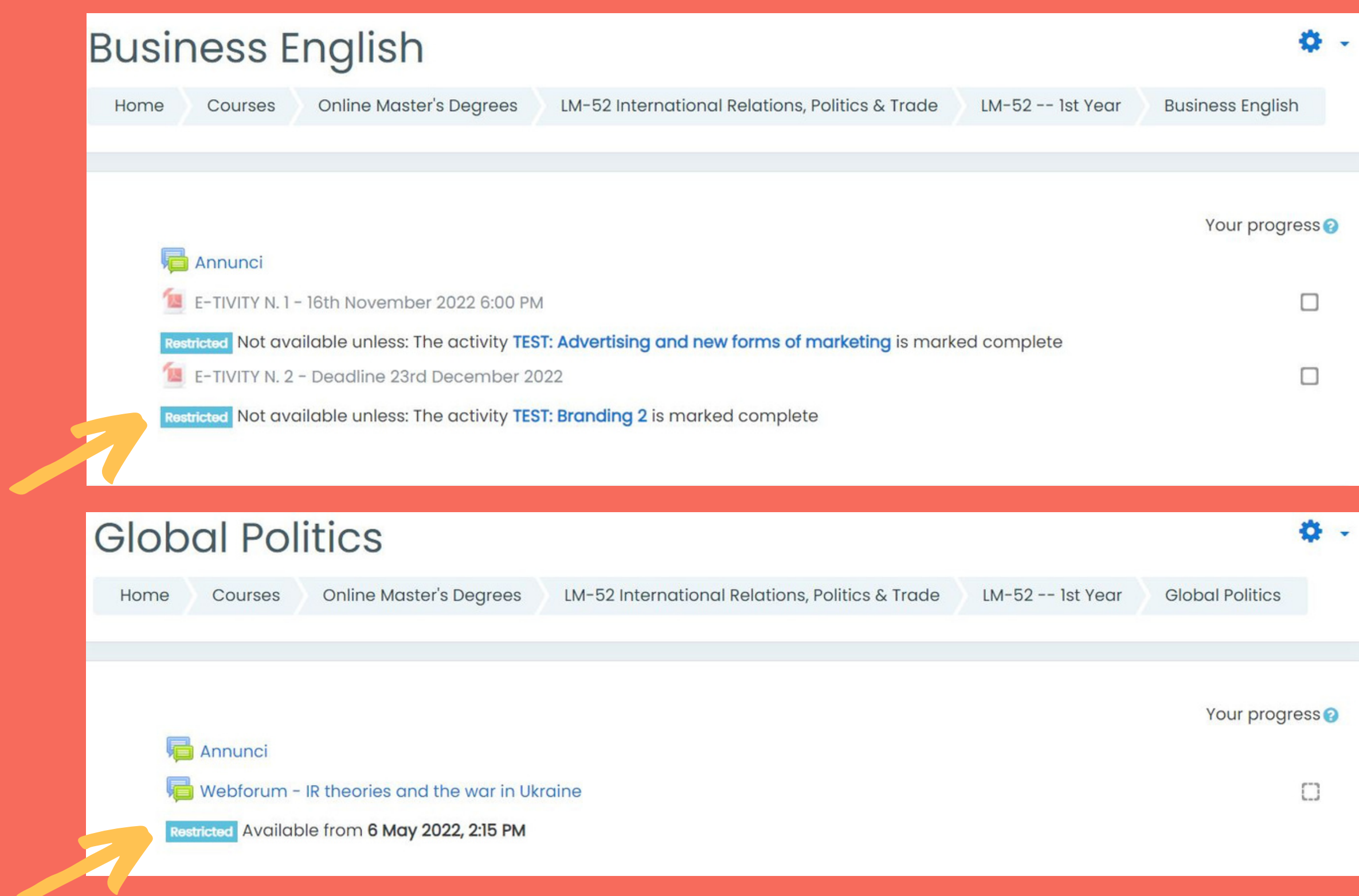
2 For each subject you can take advantage of the so-called “**e-tivities**”.

They can be found at the top of the page, and are usually accessible after a certain date and/or after the completion of a set of units (e.g. after you have successfully completed the first 10 units).

They are designed to help you gain a deeper understanding of the unit topics, apply the knowledge you've acquired through personal study hours, and test your critical thinking skills.

The e-tivities can be either provided in **asynchronous** (e.g., short essays, case studies, etc.) or **synchronous mode** (e.g., a meeting on Microsoft Teams to discuss assigned topics).

E-tivities are not compulsory, but we *strongly encourage* you to undertake this unique opportunity and participate.

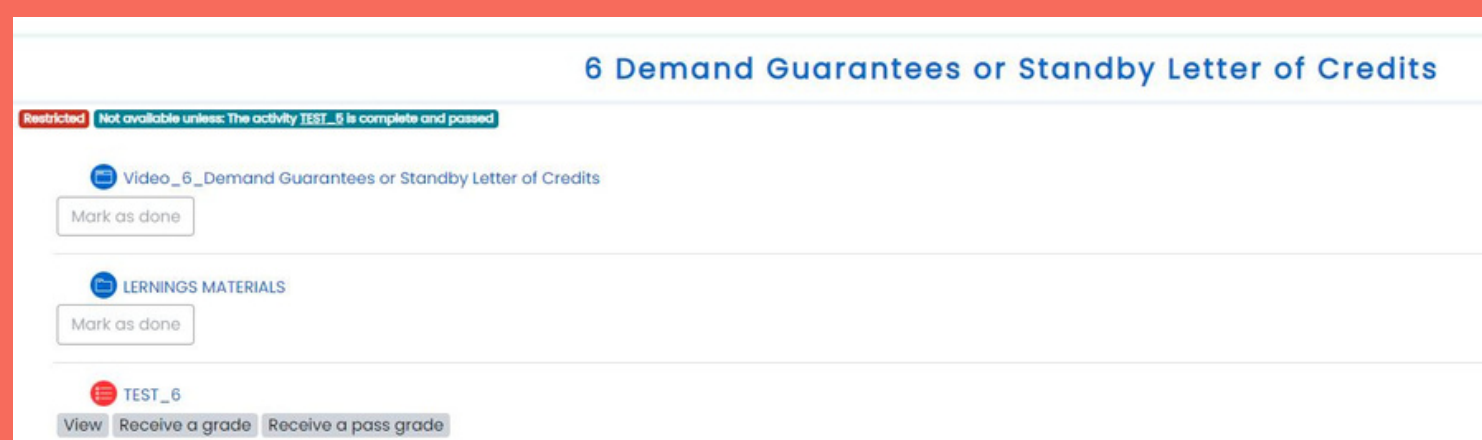
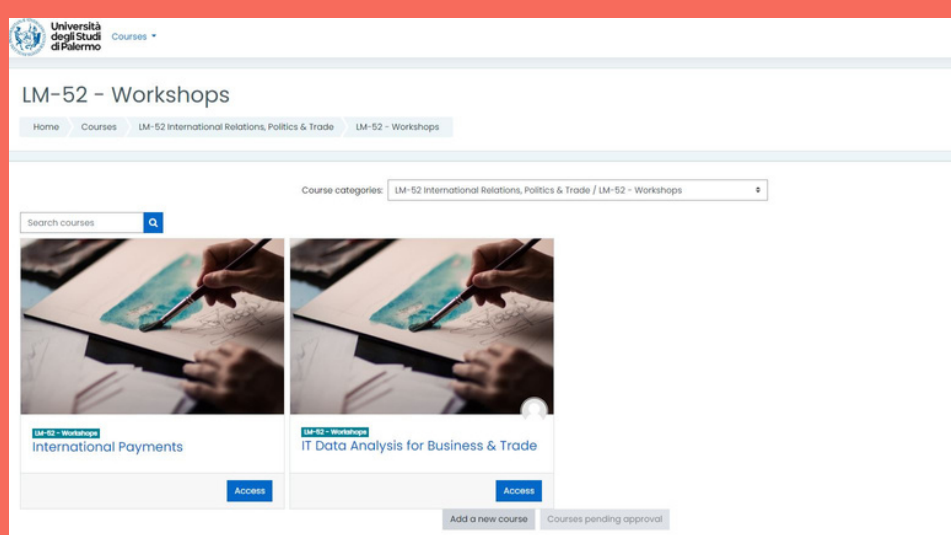


3 Additionally, you are required to complete **one workshop** of your choice.

Workshops are organized in a manner similar to subjects, with divisions into units and subparts. However, unlike subjects, the knowledge acquired in workshops does not require examination.



Nevertheless, after completing the workshop tasks, remember to promptly send an e-mail to didatticadems@unipa.it (containing the request for credit validation Module) and book the first available exam slot, so that your workshop can be officially validated.

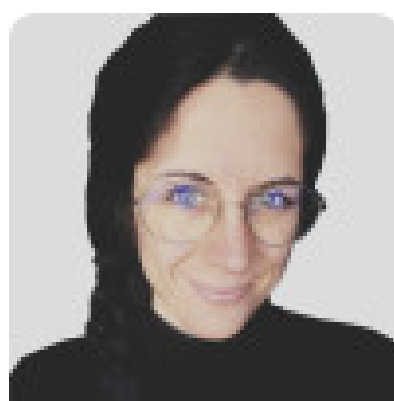


4 To successfully finish your online course and obtain a degree from the University of Palermo, it's mandatory to produce a **final thesis**, as in accordance with the requirements of the Italian educational system. Please contact the tutors to know the procedure and requested documents.

The final thesis involves conducting research on a topic typically chosen in consultation with one of the course professors.

5 Make sure you regularly **open, read and download** each lecture's material, in order to prevent an overwhelming workload right before the exam

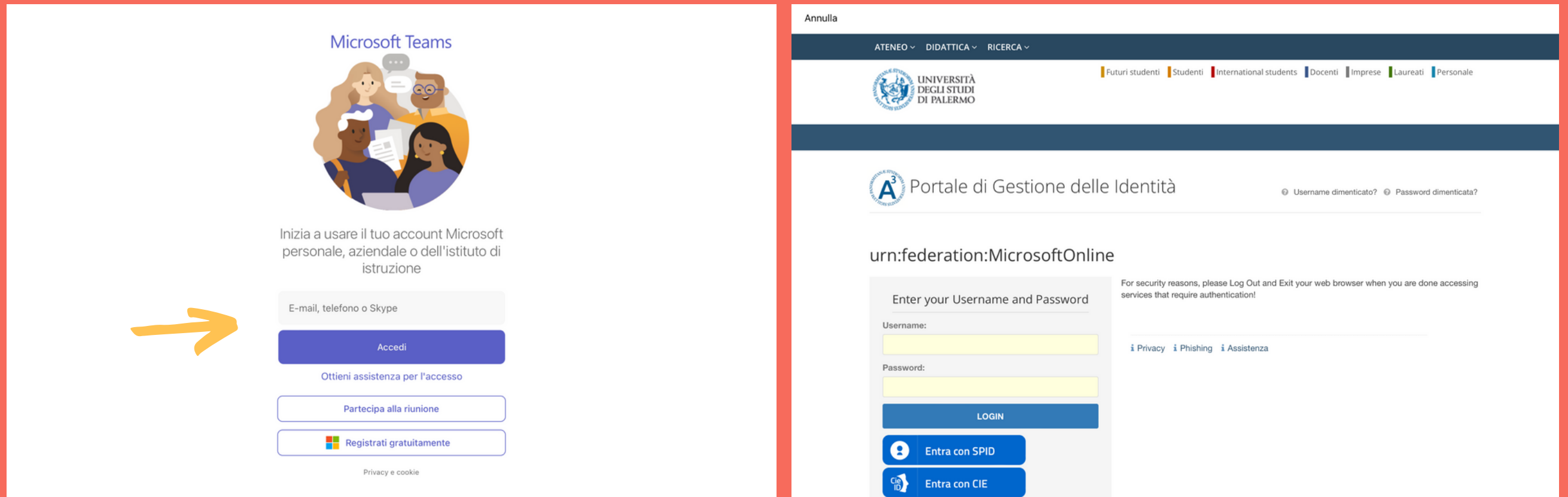
