## **GENERAL INFORMATION**

- 1. The course will commence on Monday, May 28, and conclude on Sunday, June 3. Arrival of participants is Sunday, May 27 and departure is Monday, June 4. The course will take place at the Siracusa International Institute for Criminal Justice and Human Rights which is the new public name for the International Institute of Higher Studies in Criminal Sciences (ISISC) in Siracusa, Italy and will consist of 14 working sessions. Each day will be divided into two sessions of three hours each, for a total of 42 academic contact hours.
- 2. Participants should have a university degree, ideally in law or with some studies in law, and be 35 years of age or under. Provision may be made for auditors who do not fulfil these conditions.
- 3. The working language will be English; therefore proficiency in English is required.
- 4. The number of participants will be limited to 60. Regional, geographic and gender balance will be taken into consideration.
- 5. The registration costs for the course is € 700 per person, which includes academic material, lunches on course days (7 lunches in total) and 1 closing dinner. Participants who wish the Siracusa Institute to arrange their hotel (double occupancy room and breakfast) and ground transportation from<sup>1</sup> and to Catania airport on arrival and departure days are requested to specifically notify the Siracusa Institute upon acceptance of their application. The total cost for the hotel and ground transportation is € 500 per person.
- 6. The Institute will offer 10 scholarships to applicants from developing and less developed countries. The scholarships cover academic material, accommodation costs in a double room, lunches on course days (7 lunches in total), 1 closing dinner, and ground transportation from<sup>1</sup> and to Catania airport (travel costs and dinners are not included). Participants awarded scholarships will have to pay a contribution for the course of € 200.
- 7. Participants are required to join the International Association of Penal Law, Young Penalists Section. Membership information can be found on the AIDP website (www.penal.org).
- 8. Attendance is required at all sessions. Failure to attend more than two sessions will disqualify participants from receiving a certificate of completion for the course. Active participation in classroom discussions is expected.
- 9. The deadline to apply to the 2018 course is **March 27, 2018**. The application form should be filled out online at www.siracusainstitute.org. Acceptance letters will be sent out shortly after the deadline for application. Candidates not accepted for the course will be informed accordingly.
- 10. We encourage participants to bring their own laptops with which they can connect to the internet through the Institute's wireless network.
- 11. The Institute has a library containing over 24,000 volumes in International Criminal Law and Comparative International Law which are open to the use of all participants throughout the course.
